# Notes from the Feb. 24 FCCA General Meeting

The 25 MPH sign is now up at P and Foxhall; the Volta sign is coming. Riverside Hospital site development at reduced size is supposedly approved by BZA but we don't have any other details other than that the site owner has the right to proceed.

Kent Slowinski updated us on his group's watershed conservation efforts. wks@aol.com.

Police Report: Traffic issues were mostly snow related, but speeding on MacArthur Blvd has been an issue. Dog walking without leashes (esp. professional dogwalkers) are being ticketed at \$50 for the first warning and impounding of dog on the second. Enforcement is being stepped up. Thefts from autos remain a problem, esp. people leaving cars unlocked.

Q&A with Councilwoman Mary Cheh: Mrs. Cheh now heads the Committee on Govt Operations and the Environment which covers real estate, contracting and procurement and reforms of contracting and procurement process. She continues to head the Office of Energy committee. Budget shortfalls present certain obstacles, though DC's shortfall is less problematic that some those of the surrounding constituencies. Snow was a hot topic. Cheh has introduced a bill that would make non-shovelling of sidewalks a citation that could be written by any law enforcement person (unlike the current arcane ticketing process), \$25 for residents and \$250 for businesses A colorful discussion on the morality of saving shoveled out parking spots with chairs ensued (remember winter 2010?) Alley plowing was discussed; Ms. Cheh stated that the resources simply are not there and that alleys are not in the city's plowing plan and haven't been for a long time. Trash pickup problems were also discussed. Fire hydrant update: Aspects of the issue include water pressure and the

hydrants themselves. WASA and the Fire Department report that they have identified areas of problems and put protocols in place to respond appropriately to calls in those areas. The Fire Department has tagged hydrants; only red-tagged hydrants are unserviceable. Nevertheless, many of our mains are too old and replacements of all will be an enormous expense so replacements are being done incrementally. Discussion of the condition and overuse of Hardy Field—which is permitted to Stoddert and other soccer groups for up to 10 hours a day all weekend and several nights a week for months on end-burdens both the field and the community. Ms. Cheh said she would discuss it with Parks and Rec. Proper signage of the field was discussed. GU's 10 year plan: Mrs. Cheh said we have to wait for the final plan at this point.

### Alzheimer's Study Seeks **Participants**

Laurer Ullrich, a graduate student in Neuroscience at Georgetown University studying memory in normal and pathological aging associated with Alzheimer's Disease, is recruiting participants (50+ years old) for my study. Her study involves behavioral testing of memory, attention, and language, and she is also looking for people willing to undergo an MRI of their brain (this is a non-invasive imaging technique, but because of the magnetic fields involved, people with pacemakers or

### Hillside at Georgetown University Slides into Glover-Archbold Park

Rubble and dirt left in Glover-Archbold Park from the December collapse of a hillside behind Georgetown University's Yates Field House may soon be cleaned up. "We are working with Georgetown University to get it cleared up," Acting Superintendent of Rock Creek Park Cynthia Cox said.

"The installation of a super silt fence as well as the removal of all excess soil and other debris on parkland and in the easement area will be done with motorized equipment," Cox said. She said she expected a permit request from GU the week of April 5 to do the work.

Erosion from heavy snow and rain in December caused the slope to give way, undermining the road that runs along the rim of the park, according to Linda Greenan, assistant vice president in GU's Office of External Relations. Greenan said GU's work to stabilize the road involves building one retaining wall beneath the roadway and another on the west side of the road, with backfill added to create a new slope.

The new hillside will resemble the slope created just to the south, which was a project requested by the NPS to stabilize that area, according to Greenan. Cox said that "mitigation strategies" are being used to prevent "flows from the road going over the slope." But as recently as April 3, there appeared to be little to stop erosion of the wave of dirt that spilled into the park. A netting, with a fiber mat, had been unrolled, but it only covered part of the slide.

Georgetown's draft campus plan for 2010-2020 has proposed construction of a road along the rim of the park to accommodate buses. How the condition of the slope would impact such a project is not clear.

### In Our Gardens

It is an orchid, Vanilla planifolia, that gives us the delightful flavoring essence vanilla. The six-inch or so, shriveled, blackish vanilla bean we buy is the flower's dried fruit pod from which the exquisite essence is derived. Vanilla planifolia is unique in the vast orchid family because it produces a fruit pod.

Gardeners can grow this tropical plant (or hybrid) in their homes! The vanilla vine will trellis onto a kitchen window if it has the right amount of sunlight and humidity. But there is a downside to this plant, namely getting a fruit pod and extracting the vanilla essence from it.

First a little history. Vanilla was cultivated by the Totonac Indians, rivals of the Aztecs. Spanish explorers brought vanilla back to Europe where it was hugely popular. In fact, the word vanilla is Spanish in origin. Europeans were successful in cultivating the vine in other tropical areas of the world; however, the vines remained podless. The melipona bee was the primary pollinator in Mesoamerica and there were no reliable pollinators in the new habitats. The melipona bee then allowed the Totonacs to secure a monopoly on the sale of vanilla for about 300 years.

It wasn't until the mid 1800's that the Europeans were successful in pollinating the flowers by hand which is the current pollinating method. Even in Mexico hand pollination is used as the melipona bee is nearly extinct. Hand pollinating is tricky especially since the bloom typically lasts only one day. Furthermore, the fermentation process which prepares the beans for culinary use is very extensive.

So, the production of vanilla is not the reason to grow this elegant vine. We are still dependent on the expensive store bought vanilla. However, the positive side is that when people gather in the kitchen, for instance, viewing the vine can provide the stimulus to discuss the interesting topic, botanical history.

### Earth Day Glover-Archbold Park Clean Up on April 10 Attracted a Great and Hard-working Group!

Kent Slowinski of the watershed conservation group (see meeting notes on page 2) organized a park clean up on Saturday, April 10. About 60 people showed up to comb the park north and south of Reservoir Road and the pile of resulting yellow bags was impressive. Most of the group were GW, GU and AU students, augmented by community members from our area and Glover Park. It was truly impressive to note the impact of a couple of dozen people in just a few hours.

Lest we forget the snowstorms of 2010 as we bring out the rakes and hoes and let our shovels grow rusty again...
