

## November Meeting to Provide Updates on Several Major Local Projects, and it's time for our FCCA Annual Election — Please Come!

We will have updates on three local construction projects. One is the reconstruction of the German Embassy, designed by the famous German architect Egon Eiermann and completed in 1964. It is considered by Germans to be a landmark building that must be preserved; work will begin in the spring. We will also have an update on St. Patrick's construction at the Foxhall Road Casey site. And most importantly, we'll get an update on Georgetown University's 10-year plan. Talks between GU and the coalition of community associations have broken down, but GU must file by the end of the 2010, so there is some real uncertainty about what is to come. We hope to have someone from the Burleith Citizens Association to talk about their perspective on the issue, and how they see things evolving.

Each November, according to our by-laws, we must vote in a Board for the coming year. Without a vote, the Board cannot act and there are many issues on which your Board may very well need to act. We need a quorum to vote, so please help out by showing up to vote, even if you can't stay for the entire meeting. Not to worry—although there is always room on the Board for more participation, we have candidates for all the key slots so we won't be drafting anyone who doesn't want to be drafted! We usually vote after the police report so come whenever you can.

## Trash and Leaf Issues: Keep Your Trash, Recyclables Dog Waste, and Yard Debris to Yourself Please!

A number of residents have been complaining about issues related to others people putting items in their trash and recycling containers without permission. Many residents strongly object to finding smelly dog waste in their cans—not to mention curbside leaf piles. Not Nice! But yard waste and household trash are also issues. If you use a paid yard service *please* quiz them on where exactly they are disposing of the debris they collect from your yard. Report anyone you see dumping yard waste in alleys or leaving bagged debris curbside any time other than trash day.

Seniors in the village reported that *“huge heavy bags of lawn clippings were placed on the apron in front of our garage door, within our property line, blocking access to our garage. On several occasions, bags of trash and yard clippings have been added to our trash barrel as well as to our recycling bin, filling them up. Lately however, we have seen a disturbing increase in such incidents. Dragging such heavy bags is very difficult for those of us in our eighties. We ask our neighbors to please be more considerate, and diligent in their trash disposal.*

*“If landscaping companies are employed, we ask that the homeowners direct them to dispose of their yard waste at a designated off-site waste disposal facility. The District government should not have to haul away privately generated yard waste.*

*“As fall approaches, we will have many more leaves on the ground. Please do not continue to dispose of them at the expense of your neighbors.”* Well said!

## Fall Leaf Collection for Our Area will be Nov 8 to 20 and December 6 to 18.

City contractors collect loose leaves from treeboxes with special trucks. Only loose leaves are recycled as compost; bagged leaves are treated as trash which is not very green. No limbs and branches in the leaf piles please. Bagged leaves go out on trash day wherever your trash is collected.

## Clearing Sidewalks of Snow (and leaves) is the Responsibility of all Residents, including Renters!

When the winter arrives, with the heavy rains, the ice, and the snow, please be certain that your sidewalks, walkways and steps are kept clear of all debris — leaves, mud piles, branches, dead flowers, overhanging limbs, etc. In addition, make sure you have a snow shovel handy! If you are unable to keep your sidewalks clear, please ask a neighbor to help you or hire someone to do the work for you. Here's wishing us all a safe winter!

### Abuse of Hardy Field

Use of the field by any group requires a permit. Groups playing without DC Parks and Rec permits, and use of the field following heavy rainfall by any group imperils the over-used field. Any misuse of the field should be reported immediately to the Urban Rangers at 311.

### Illegally Parked Cars

Report cars obstructing sidewalks or displaying suspicious guest parking permits by calling 311.

Note: D.C. law requires people who live in the city for more than 30 days to register their cars with the D.C. Department of Motor Vehicles or face a \$100 ticket every day. This applies to cars parked on private property as well as on streets.

### Construction without Permits

To report construction proceeding without required permits or that appears to violate code, call DCRA at 202-442-4400 and they will send an inspector very quickly. The Foxhall Neighborhood Watch has been launched with eighteen people signing on to be Block Captains in the Foxhall Village area. They are Clair Swift and Mary Gaughan (for Reservoir Road), Scott Polk, Laurie Dromerick, and John Bray (for 44th Street), Mary Ann Griffin (for the Village side of Foxhall Road), Jan Smart, and Olya and Bob Duezay (for Greenwich Parkway), Venessa and Paul Cornoni (for Surrey Lane), Sara Paulson, Joann Cogar and Margot Squires (for Q Street), Chrys Miliaras and William Bateson (for Volta Place), and Ed Farley and Mike Harbold (for P Street). Thanks so much to all these safety minded folks who will, hopefully, make a difference in the future well-being of our Village. If you haven't already given them your phone numbers and emails, please do so as you will want to know about the rash of crimes in our neighborhood, and may not know otherwise. (Email mallorylawsonasid@msn.com if you don't know your captain.) The idea is for everyone to have a block chart with all your neighbors' information so you can be in touch with one another when you're way, having work done, suspect something suspicious, have an emergency, need help, etc. The more we communicate with each other, the safer we'll all be.

The shocking news is that 75 to 80 percent of the recent crimes are *preventable* by simply *locking up!* Most crimes are due to *open doors* in both homes and cars. During the recent nice weather, there was also a rash of home break-ins thru open windows. The criminals come in by cutting the screens (even on the second floors), and this is completely preventable. It has happened during the day and at night. There are inexpensive and easy to install devices available at the local Ace Hardware Stores to set off

a screeching alarm if the window or door is moved. If you don't have a dog, this is an effective deterrent. Using key operated dead bolt locks is also effective. Otherwise locks are fairly easy to access. Having outside lights installed that are on after dark or are on motion sensors are also good deterrents. The criminals are having lots of luck getting their booty in our area, and we want to make it impossible for them so they'll give up. As long as there's good fishing in the Foxhall Village pond, they'll keep returning.

## Let's Get Serious About Crime

During the last two months, there have been 43 crimes in our Police Patrol area, PSA 205, which covers an area that includes Foxhall, Palisades, Kent, Berkeley, Spring Valley, and the American University. Of those, 15 occurred in our neighborhood.

The most prevalent crimes are burglary, theft, and theft from auto. To make this a risky area for thieves/criminals to operate and to make it as non-profitable as possible, we need to be reporting any suspicious activity by calling 911, locking your front and back doors, and removing valuables or perceived valuables from your car.

## September and October Neighborhood Crime Stats

Assault with a deadly weapon (not gun): 1 total at Q and MacArthur  
Burglaries: 5 total in the 4400 blocks of Greenwich, Reservoir, and P, and on Salem Lane, and 47th Place.  
Theft: 2 total on Kenmore and 45th streets.

Theft from auto: 6 total on Greenwich Pkwy (2), MacArthur Blvd (2), and Salem Ln (2)

Stolen Auto: 1 on Greenwich Pkwy  
If you look at this closely, you notice four crimes on Greenwich, three on Salem Lane, and three at MacArthur and Q.

## Planning Exterior Projects?

As a reminder, DC building permits are required for many common renovation projects. Below is a partial list of exterior work that requires a permit *whether or not you live in the Foxhall Village Historic District*, and whether you are renovating the front of your home or the back:

- Additions
- Decks, new or replacement
- Dormers, new or replacement
- Exterior lighting, new
- Fences, new or replacement
- HVAC equipment, new or replacement
- Paving (including steps), new or replacement
- Retaining walls, new or replacement
- Roof, replacement

Additional permits required for the Historic District only:

- Front doors, new or replacement
- Windows, new or replacement
- Window openings, new or expanded (only allowable in the rear of homes in historic district)

## Real Estate Corner

It has been a very interesting year in Washington real estate. Inventory, which had been low through the second half of 2009, really bottomed out as the year ended. It has remained low throughout 2010, but with a recent spike in September that almost matched last September’s numbers. The second part to the low inventory story is the shortage of good (desirable) inventory—homes with updated kitchens and bathrooms that are in move-in condition. Homes that meet these criteria sell quickly provided they are priced well.

Concerning sales volume, The First Time Homebuyer’s tax credit spiked sales in April and May but volume for June through September has not met last year’s numbers.

On a positive note, average and median prices seem to have bottomed and are remaining flat. This is likely due to the composition and strength of the DC job market and the fact that low inventory has kept prices up. On the flip side, low inventory and firm

pricing have added to the frustrations and reluctance of home buyers, and kept sales volume lower. Part of this problem is what I explain as the gulf in expectations between sellers and buyers. Sellers remember what their houses were worth. Buyers believe what they read in the newspapers, and are frustrated by the lack of good choices available.

It is possible prices may drop a little more through the fall as sellers face the end of the fall market and tire of holding. I anticipate that prices should firm up and that inventory will pick up a bit for the spring market. Overall I don’t see large increases in real estate prices over the next three years. On the positive side, we can expect our real estate tax assessments not to go up for next year.
