Notes from Recent GDS and Lab School BZA Meetings

GDS Meeting: Representatives of the FCCA area and Georgetown Day School met on Wednesday, September 14. Many topics were discussed relating to traffic, parking, and impacts of the School on the neighborhood. GDS is at its enrollment cap of 575 students. Neighbors reported some problems with being unable to park on their streets near their homes due to GDS parents parking up the streets. GDS reported that was due to specific meetthe-teacher open houses and assured us that they would try to avoid similar problems next year. GDS reported that they are committed to reducing impacts on the neighborhood caused by parents parking near the school on normal school days; walking to and from campus with children violates BZA orders for drop-off and pick-up, which are to happen on school property. GDS said they have increased queuing space to make it unnecessary for parents/nannies to park off-site for afternoon pickup and assured the FCCA that they are policing walk-ons rigorously, and that GDS started parent education campaigns this year even before the first day of school, without the usual "grace period" for parental compliance. Traffic in the morning remains an issue, in part due to new rules that the police must remain on the sidewalks to direct traffic, which is not the ideal way to do it; GDS continues to try to work out alternatives. FCCA reiterated objections to excessive use of whistles as a noise pollution issue for nearby homes and apartments.

There are several special events on the GDS calendar that will involve parents parking in the neighborhood (such as their Harvest Festival) but GDS promised to notify the FCCA in advance of those dates. Neighbors are again invited to participate. Flu shots should again be available for a fee. **The Lab School** quarterly meeting on September 28 focused on options for removing English ivy strangling mature trees on the school property overlooking Hardy Field and on addressing traffic and parking issues in reference to the school.

Lab School's arborist, Eagle Scout, Tim Boyd, joined Head of School Katherine Schantz and neighborhood liaison Peter Braun in discussing ways to save the trees without using herbicides. The Nature Conservancy, the National Park Service, the U.S. Botanic Garden, and the Chesapeake Bay Trust have jointly produced a brochure and wallet insert about invasive plants and trees and native species to choose in the Potomac River Watershed instead. Possibilities for a project beneficial to the school, the students, and the community were enthusiastically discussed. Peter Braun will do some checking and announce a recommended solution.

The Board of Zoning Adjustment order for the Lab School (number 17944 of July 28, 2009) specifies that the school shall implement a traffic management plan to regulate vehicle access and parking on the property. The plan shall include a provision of shuttle service and other methods to reduce the use of private automobiles by staff and parents. The school may modify the plan to respond to changing traffic conditions, subject to discussions with the community liaison committee. Zoning regulations have provisions for private schools to operate in residential neighborhoods provided that they do not create objectionable conditions such as noise, traffic, or number of students.

Thanks to Susan Klusman for identifying the tree matter. The next meeting is scheduled for Tues, Nov. 9, at 6 p.m.

Note: D.C. law requires people who live in the city for more than 30 days to register their cars with the D.C. Department of Motor Vehicles or face a \$100 ticket every day. This applies to cars parked on private property as well as on streets.



Neighborhood Watch Update MALLORY LARSON

The available Block Captains met Thursday, Oct. 7 to get a Foxhall Crime Prevention Program started. Neighborhood Watch will be one of the components, but given the amount of crime that is taking place in our neighborhood, we need more action and education to help reduce the number of incidents and be truly effective. There are still blocks with no captains—Volta, P Street, the 1400 block of 44th Street and Surrey Lane as well as all areas outside of Foxhall Village itself, where no one has stepped forward to organize their blocks although the problem is certainly not limited to the "Village". Non-participating areas may not be made aware of what is happening right on their streets. The majority of crimes are still due to people not locking their windows and doors, but the car break-ins continue to be rampant even when the windows are closed and doors lock and there's nothing of value in sight and there have been several troubling break-and-enters as well with residents at home and asleep. We still remain statistically safer than some neighboring areas, but that also means police are more concentrated elsewhere. Palisades Village Off to a Strong Start in our Area

Palisades Village volunteers are now providing an average of 90 services a month to older neighbors who want to remain in their homes and stay involved in the life of our community.

The nonprofit membership organization, funded by a combination of dues and tax-deductible contributions, provides a wide array of support services and social opportunities to older residents in the FCCA area, as well as the Palisades.

In its new Report 2010 covering its first 18 months of services Palisades Village reports:

- Membership has grown to over 80.
- Volunteers helped members more than 900 times, rising to an average of 90 a month in 2010.
- Over 160 neighbors contributed.
- More than 80 adults and numerous kids and teens volunteered.
- Rides to medical appointments are 43 percent of all services provided.
- Social activities were popular, with attendance averaging 38 per event.
- More than 30 organizations, from local congregations and the Palisades Citizens Association to Iona Senior Services and AARP, partnered with Palisades Village on selected projects.

"While the numbers are important, I have the privilege of seeing many of the stories behind them," said Executive Director Sonia Crow. She recalled "neighbors who live a stone's throw from each other meeting for the first time through Palisades Village, friendships developing during rides to the doctor, and folks getting together for a good time."
