

Georgetown University's 2010 Campus Plan: Neighborhood Representatives Unite in Expressing their Concerns to DC Government Officials

Speaking with one voice and conveying the concerns of Wards 2 and 3, representatives of Georgetown, Burleith, and Glover Park citizens' associations, the FCCA, and members of ANC2E (Georgetown and Burleith) and ANC3D (Foxhall Village, Colony Hill, and the Georgetown Reservoir Area) combined forces to reach out to the City Administrator and the staff of the Council Chairman about Georgetown University's 2010 campus plan on July 8. Citing "saturation" by the University, neighborhood speakers focused on issues such as increased enrollment and the resulting impacts on residential communities: exacerbated traffic and parking problems, deferred maintenance of group houses, declining property values, inappropriate student conduct, and GU's proposal to construct a "loop road" along the steep slope of the western border of Glover Archbold Park to provide a route for GU's buses. The park road proposal is inconsistent with terms of a scenic easement by which the University obtained 2.5 acres of National Park Service land on Canal Road to enlarge the campus entrance in exchange for preserving open space and using a road to be constructed for "service vehicles" only. [See also notes from FCCA's June General Meeting, which focused on GU's plan.]

Foxhall Community Citizens' Association Board President Bob Avery and Advisory Neighborhood Commissioner Ann Haas spoke on behalf of our neighborhood. Joining in opposing the campus plan were Citizens Association of Georgetown President Jennifer Altemus, Burleith Citizens' Association Vice President Walter Hillabrant, Glover Park Citizens' Association Board Member Karen Keating, and Commissioners from ANC2E Ron Lewis (Chair), Bill Starrels (Georgetown), and Ed Solomon (Burleith).

Georgetown University has yet to file its plan with the Zoning Commission so there is no further action to be taken at this time, though the FCCA Board continues to closely monitor the situation. Zoning Commission rules require that hearings take place no sooner than 45 days after filing, and GU's filing must occur by December. Since they have not yet filed, we've postponed the September meeting, which was going to focus on FCCA's next steps.

Volunteers and Nominations for the 2011 FCCA Board Needed

The FCCA Board of Directors will be elected at our November 17 General meeting. We would like to have each of the FCCA neighborhoods represented on the Board. However, to accomplish this we need members who live west of Foxhall Road—Charleston Terrace/Kenmore Drive/Indian Rock Terrace, the 4500-4700 block of Reservoir Road, MacArthur Blvd., and the neighborhoods south of MacArthur. Directors serve a one-year term, must be a member of the FCCA and live within the FCCA geographic area. The Board meets once a month, usually the last Sunday. Each Director assumes responsibility for an area of interest, such as police liaison, school liaison, traffic concerns, development, etc. or serves as an “at large” member. The Board as a whole sets the agenda for the membership meetings and acts in lieu of the membership when issues arise that require immediate action. Summary of June 16 General Membership Meeting

Police Report: Office McElwee reported that the police are very aware of increased crime in our area. Police responses have been modified to respond quickly, and with multiple cars, to reports of suspicious persons. Patrols of the area have been increased. Residents asked what they can do and if Neighborhood Watch programs work. A sign-up list of interested people was sent around. Bob Avery commented that even though our area is relatively safe, we should continue to be a squeaky wheel because our crime rate is going up, perhaps in part because our low-crime PSA has lost resources to other districts to bring their crime rates down—so we need to demand our resources back!

GU's Plan: A lengthy discussion of GU's plan was the main focus of the meeting. GU's draft plan has been getting very negative reviews from Burleigh. The FCCA is talking with Georgetown, Burleigh, Glover Park, and other groups to avoid allowing GU to pursue a divide and conquer strategy. The FCCA has to take a position and our membership has to vote to support that position. The city's review process can be unpredictable and move quickly at times, or have long lulls. We must be prepared.

Items of Concern in GU's Plan:

- More graduate students.
- GU has grown and their growth impacts surrounding neighborhoods to a degree that has reached a tipping point. Burleigh feels it is past that point, with deteriorating properties and family flight.
- 80 foot smokestack, which we don't fully understand the purpose of.
- Change of bus plan: All buses to travel from Canal Road, along a proposed new road on the Glover Archbold side of Yates, changing the traffic pattern at Canal Road.

- Add roof to Yates field. Height, lighting and details unspecified.
- Boathouse: No new information but there appears to be no move towards building on that site at this time.
- 2010 graduate student enrollment is already up from 2009 by over 10%. Total number is to go up 50% over 10 years, over half of whom would be being continuing students—evening students, federal employment, new programs with adjunct faculty. How would this impact us? Where would they park? Where will they live? Foxhall now has only 17 undergraduate students by GU's numbers—fewer than other nearby areas—but the impacts of student rentals even in small numbers affect the neighborhood.
- But we have nearly 300 graduate students—more than any other surrounding area.
- The hospital is a separate major issue that is *not* included in the University's plan. Hospital parking must be shared 50/50 with the University. The hospital facility is old and needs to be replaced soon. They are also looking at a 10% increase in hospital employees. (1000 people over 10 years.)
- Georgetown Citizens don't object to GU's proposed loop road plan because it gets the problem away from their side of campus. We have told GSA that if they don't support us on our issue, we cannot support GSA on issues that affect them but not us.
- Widening the road will affect us and affect the Glover Archbold Park, as will heightening a 30-foot tall smokestack that we cannot see now to add an additional 80 feet, which will make it the tallest thing on campus, and visible from parts of our area.
- Yates field house now has a roof with artificial turf on it, which has all sorts of problems. GU's solution is to put a roof over the field. We are not sure whether a roof would help or hurt us...it could increase light and noise or reduce it...we just don't know. We

believe it could also increase usage of the field, given high GU demand for sports field space.

Discussion followed on how the Board should proceed to act on behalf of the membership. The general consensus was that the Board should not give ground on *any* issue without a vote of the general membership.


Votes: It was moved, seconded and unanimously approved to 1) Empower the Board to spend up to \$3,500 on consultants as needed to clarify facts on impacts of various aspects of the GU plan, such as how visible a roof and smoke stack would be, and how much noise a loop road would generate. **And 2)** Empower the Board to act to oppose the plan if needed without having had a general meeting, if a general meeting cannot be convened in time.

Overview: Generally, the Board heard complete support from those present for the position the Board has taken to date. The community supports the Board to proceed in opposing all of the parts of the plan listed above—roof, loop road, increasing enrollment and smokestack. Further, the Board was not empowered to agree to *any settlement or concession on any of the discussed issues* without a general meeting and vote.

Note New No-Right-Turns Off of Foxhall Road at P and Volta!

New signs have been installed according to the requests of residents of lower Foxhall Village to reduce morning cut-through traffic. The new signs prohibit traffic coming up/north on Foxhall Road from making right turns onto P and Volta anytime—making exceptions for residents is no longer legal under DC law. The FCCA is attempting to get older no-left-turn signs removed for southbound traffic at P and Volta, which now serve little function. But residents should note that they can be ticketed for making *any* turn from Foxhall onto P or Volta at this time, so other streets should be used.

Visitor Parking Pass Program

Mary Cheh's pilot program for our area, where residents receive parking passes for use by their guests and workmen, has been extended and residents should have received new passes. If you did not receive a replacement pass, please contact Damon Harvey (damon.harvey@dc.gov) at DDOT. Rules for use of the passes are on the backs of the passes; they are not to be used in lieu of registering so please report any abuse of the passes as well.

Plant or Replace a Tree!

There are several great reasons to add trees to your property: storm water mitigation, reduced heating and cooling costs, increased property values, privacy, and improved air quality. And two programs help you plant trees on your property:

- Through the Riversmart Homes Program, District homeowners can have shade trees planted on their property for only \$50 per tree.
- Or, purchase, plant and care for a tree on your private residential property in DC and receive a \$50 rebate. See the caseytrees.org website.

Palisades Weather Station

The Palisades Weather Station is now online, broadcasting live temperature, humidity, barometric pressure, wind speed and direction, and rainfall rate from the Key School parking lot around the globe via the Internet. The station is reporting on ID KDCWASHI21. You can view up-to-the minute Palisades weather from anywhere by visiting the Palisades Weather Station website, www.wunderground.com/weatherstation/WXDailyHistory.asp?ID=KDCWASHI21.

Weather conditions are quite localized and can vary dramatically within a few miles. Conditions in the Palisades often differ significantly from the nearest National Weather Service station at Washington National Airport, which is separated from the Palisades by the Potomac River and sits at a lower altitude. This is particularly true during major weather events.

The Palisades Weather Station was made possible by a grant from the Palisades Community Fund. Special thanks to Key principal David Landeryou and Key science teacher Amy Johnson for their help in getting it installed.

Crime Fighting Tips

This year has shown a significant increase in crime in the FCCA area. In response to citizen concern, and some leadership from our neighbor Mallory Lawson is establishing a Neighborhood Watch. The police have been very active and visible in the neighborhood following the two armed robberies on Reservoir and Volta, but crimes have continued to occur. Fighting crime isn't solely a police function. As neighbors, we have to do our part to reduce crime. Here are six tips that will help prevent us from becoming victims.

Know your neighbors. One of the most important parts of crime prevention is to form a good defensive team—neighbors looking after neighbors. We need to know each other better—by sight, and how to contact each other.

Lock your front AND back doors

Thieves are going door to door, front and back looking for open doors. Even if you are in the house, lock your door. It only takes a second to steal a purse from the foyer.

Turn on your outdoor lights (front and back) in the evening and leave them on until morning. Dark homes will be robbed before ones that are well lit.

Lock your car. Do not leave valuables in your car. Thieves will break your window and steal whatever is visible.

GPS devices, iPods, cell phones, cameras, and briefcases are all desirable. Hopefully no one would leave a laptop computer in their car!

Crime awareness. Be aware of crime that occurs in the neighborhood. Share information with your neighbors of events you know that have occurred. Forewarned is forearmed.

Call 911. If you see a suspicious person or suspicious activity in the neighborhood, call 911.

Neighborhood Watch

Samantha Nolan, the Neighborhood Watch coordinator for the District of Columbia, held two meetings this summer at the Hardy Rec Center for those people interested in forming a Neighborhood Watch group. Many people attended, and about a dozen signed on to be Block Captains. Unfortunately nobody wanted to be the Director, so after a summer of nobody coming forward, by default, I have decided to spearhead this effort as part of a larger one to help combat rising crime in our area.

Within my block alone, the 1600 end of 44th Street, there have been six crimes over the summer months. Most of these have involved cars (stolen, dropped, or broken into), but two were home break-ins. This is not going to stop until we actually do something, and it needs to be a group effort. Most crimes are “crimes of opportunity” and can be prevented by locking doors and putting valuables out of sight. Hopefully, we'll be able to get more information out to those who did not attend the meetings, and that should reduce these numbers. Read the *Northwest Current* to get an idea of what is going on in and around our area—or sign up for everyblock.com or the Palisades Citizens Association listserve to get email crime updates.

Abuse of Hardy Field

Use of the field by any group requires a permit. Groups playing without DC Parks and Rec permits, and use of the field following heavy rainfall by any group imperils the over-used field. Any misuse of the field should be reported immediately to the Urban Rangers at 311.

Illegally Parked Cars

Report cars obstructing sidewalks or displaying suspicious guest parking permits by calling 311.

Note: D.C. law requires people who live in the city for more than 30 days to register their cars with the D.C. Department of Motor Vehicles or face a \$100 ticket every day. This applies to cars parked on private property as well as on streets.

Construction without Permits

To report construction proceeding without required permits or that appears to violate code, call DCRA at 202-442-4400 and they will send an inspector very quickly. For work that appears to be contrary to the guidelines in the Historic District call Anne Brockett, 202-442-8842 or anne.brockett@dc.gov.
