Breaking News! The June 20th FCCA Membership Meeting to Focus on a Proposed Negotiated Settlement of the 10 Year Campus Plan Conflict Between Georgetown University and Neighboring Associations Including the FCCA

Eighteen months ago the FCCA membership voted to join other citizens' associations in opposing Georgetown University's 10 year campus plan proposal. Central among the FCCA's concerns were a proposed loop road carrying buses along the edge of Glover Archbold Park and an 1,000 student expansion of graduate students, putting additional strains on an already strained neighborhood housing stock. With help from council-member Mary Cheh, the FCCA was able to get Georgetown to withdraw the loop road. But other issues remained.

Since early May a team of neighborhood negotiators has been meeting with Georgetown to try to seek solutions to remaining points of conflict. The FCCA has been a part of these discussions. I am happy to report that a proposed negotiated settlement which addresses most of the neighborhood's concerns, including graduate students, has emerged.

On June 5th the FCCA board voted unanimously and enthusiastically to recommend approval of the settlement by the full FCCA membership at the June 20th meeting. The Board believes that the settlement goes a long way toward addressing our

immediate concerns with the campus plan and lays out a framework for a permanent, long-run planning partnership between Georgetown and the communities. By ratifying the agreement the FCCA earns a seat at that table.

At the June 20th meeting, representatives of the negotiating team from both the communities and Georgetown will be there to explain the details of the proposal. This will enable all members of the FCCA community to judge the merits of the plan themselves. I urge you to come to the meeting, listen, and then air your views. Hope to see you there.

Remembering Longtime Foxhall Village Resident Dr. Luce de Vitry-Maubrey

Dr. Luce de Vitry-Maubrey, a long-time resident of Foxhall Village, died recently at age 88 from complications of a broken hip. Luce was a long-time member of the FCCA and was active in Palisades Village from her home at 4402 Volta. She is survived by three children, Annick, Benoit and Regis, and eight grandchildren.

Luce was born close to Bordeaux in France, and came to this country with her family on a cargo ship in 1941. Until age 17, Luce had only two years of formal education, yet she went on to earn both a Masters degree in Philosophy from Georgetown University and a Doctorate from Nanterre University in Paris, where she graduated summa cum laude. Her doctoral thesis was subsequently published, and a copy can be found at the Library of Congress.

For twenty years, Luce taught at Howard University. After her retirement, she focused on improving the schooling and nutrition of children in remote Haitian mountain villages. Luce established a tax deductible organization, Friends of Haiti, and devoted her time to fund raising for it. Luce will be missed, but we celebrate a life well lived and offer condolences to her family.

Notes from March FCCA Meeting

Officer Anthony Mc Elwee (anthony.mcelwee@dc.gov), 2nd District, reported that overall crime this year vs. last year is down 15% in our area. We have the lowest crime statistics of all the PSA's in the 2nd District. Thefts and thefts from automobiles continue to be the most prevalent crimes. And the speed camera on Foxhall Road has slowed down of traffic.

Mat Thorp from Palisades Partners discussed airplane noise in our neighborhood. He stated that it is a federal issue to reduce the frequency of flights from Reagan National Airport, and that Eleanor Holmes Norton is the appropriate contact. Mr. Thorp would like the FCCA to join the Palisades Partners Advisory Board.

Bob Avery, FCCA President, introduced Ward 3 D.C. Councilmember Mary Cheh by acknowledging her support of the FCCA's successful effort in stopping the Loop Road at Georgetown University. Ms. Cheh discussed serious campaign finance irregularities on the DC Council. It appears that money donations are in essence being used to buy votes. Therefore, Ms. Cheh has introduced legislation for a ban on corporate giving. Her bill deals with prohibiting "Pay to Play", requiring disclosure of external fundraising activities, and a ban on corporate contributions. Curiously, to date, Ms. Cheh has not received strong support from her fellow Councilmembers. Ward 4

Councilmember Muriel Bowser is the head of the committee dealing with this issue (mbowser@dccouncil.us). An email to Ms. Bowser indicating support of Ms. Cheh's bill would be appreciated.

Ms. Cheh is also working to get universities in DC to pay a required amount of money since they do not pay taxes. This endeavor is called, Payment In Lieu of Taxes (PILOT).

Use of Hardy Field: A permit was denied for the community to use the field for a weekend event. Ms. Cheh will work with Bob Avery on this issue to allow the community at least one day a week of access to the field.

Foxhall Village Historic District: Windows, Roofs, Doors!

Attention Homeowners: Over the past few months the DC Historic Preservation Office has cited a number of owners for unpermitted work on their front façade. These cases resulted in fines and the requirement to re-do the work. Violations were mainly for inappropriate window and front door replacement, typically the installation of vinyl windows or doors. Vinyl windows and doors are never considered appropriate in the historic district.

The Parks Conservancy

I hope you had a chance to get outside and enjoy some of our neighborhood parks this spring. Special thanks to everyone who joined us for the Potomac River Watershed Cleanup last month.

This year we had three cleanup sites in Glover Archbold and two more sites in the C&O Canal National Historical Park. Brownie troop #3821 from Oyster Adams Elementary School joined us and helped pull invasive garlic mustard plants.

In previous cleanups, we had more than eighty people, including students from environmental groups at Georgetown, George Washington and American University. Whole Foods Market and Starbucks Coffee have been very generous in donating bagels, muffins, juice and coffee.

Next year, we're considering having 5-7 cleanup sites so that neighbors can walk from one cleanup site to the next. We'll have special awards for ambitious volunteers who walk and cleanup the entire six mile round trip loop. We'd like to encourage more neighbors to get involved in practicing stewardship of our neighborhood parkland.

If you have been exploring the parks - Glover Archbold, C&O, Battery Kemble, Whitehaven or Wesley Heights - you may have noticed trash at an abandoned campsite, a leaking sewer line with discolored water and foul odors, or perhaps a severely eroded trail, stream or outfall. Recently, groups have been organized to address some of these issues in Rock Creek, Dumbarton Oaks Park and Little Falls. The Rock Creek Conservancy, Dumbarton Oaks Park Conservancy and Little Falls Watershed Alliance are doing some

excellent work organizing park cleanups, invasive plant removals, storm drain labeling, bird walks, creek walks, stream monitoring teams, wildlife habitat restoration, trail repairs and fundraising; while partnering with the National Park Service, the Center for Urban Ecology, the District's Department of the Environment, DC Water, the Anacostia Watershed Society and other agencies and organizations. Several neighbors are already doing some of these things in our neighborhood parks.

I learned last month at a Dumbarton Oaks Park Conservancy event at the Italian Embassy, that DC Water is considering a major sewer rehabilitation project in Glover Archbold Park. The project includes relining the sanitary sewers, replacing lateral sewer lines that cross Foundry Branch and daylighting Foundry Branch. Daylighting involves bringing the stream out of the storm sewers and back to the surface, restoring the natural flow of the stream. This is a step in the right direction, but it is going to have a major impact on the parkland.

It's important to have a seat at the table to help guide the plans for our neighborhood parkland. The time is right to follow the lead of other groups and form a conservancy to address the issues in Glover Archbold, C&O, Battery Kemble, Whitehaven and Wesley Heights Parks. We're calling it The Parks Conservancy until someone comes up with a better name.

There are many knowledgeable and resourceful neighbors who have offered their services. A Georgetown University professor has offered to organize a series of environmental lectures. A history buff has offered to organize pre-history tours explaining how the Algonquins settled the

area. The Director of the Audubon Naturalist Society has offered to organize bird walks and make his migratory bird data available on a website. We just need someone to design the website.

We'd like to know what you think. What would you like to see? How would you like to help? We'd like to hear from you. You don't have to be a former Department of Interior Secretary or a Chesapeake Bay Foundation Board Member, but it would be nice to hear from you as well.

One of the first things we would like to do is name the main trail in Glover Archbold Park in honor of Rachel Carson (see Howard Bray's article). *Life Magazine* did an article on Rachel Carson in Glover Archbold Park in 1962, the same year Silent Spring was published. We recently learned it might require an Act of Congress, but we have the support of Congresswoman Eleanor Holmes Norton, Ward 3 Councilmember Mary Cheh, and several citizens' associations.

Please let me know if you would like to be part of The Parks Conservancy. I would like to encourage everyone to join us and follow in Rachel Carson's footsteps.

Name Our Park Trail To Honor Rachel Carson

She was a probing biologist, a graceful writer and a courageous defender of a natural environment. Her best-selling book “Silent Spring”—published 50 years ago this September—warned of the growing harm from unrestricted use of pesticides such as DDT. Her efforts helped build the case for the ensuing pesticide regulations, and laws to extraordinary career was spent at the Department of the Interior; no public memorial in the district honors her. Glover Archbold Park presents a compelling opportunity to make up for that absence.

A few weeks after “Silent Spring” was published LIFE magazine ran an essay on Carson and the hornet’s nest of controversy she had stirred up. Illustrating the article was a large photograph of Carson leading a group from the Audubon Naturalists Society on a bird-watching walk in Glover Archbold. Another picture shows her talking with children about the woods around them. The chemical industry and the U.S. Department of Agriculture championed the unmitigated use of pesticides and disputed Carson’s warnings. In the LIFE article, Carson said of the controversy: “It’s always so easy to assume that someone else is taking care of things. People say, ‘we wouldn’t be allowed to use these things if they were dangerous’. It just isn’t so. Trusting so-called authority is not enough. A sense of personal responsibility is what we desperately need.” A presidential review later supported Carson’s scientific findings. Carson’s observations in Glover Archbold took her along the three-mile trail, which runs from Canal Road to Van Ness Street. Naming this pathway the Rachel Carson Nature

Trail would be a fitting reminder of Caron’s huge environmental legacy. A national wildlife refuge, a US postage stamp and the presidential Medal of Freedom have honored Carson, who died of cancer in 1964 at 56. Since the Interior Department governs Glover Archbold, the Secretary of the Interior should designate the trail for Rachel Carson. Congressional Delegate Eleanor Holmes Norton supports this idea of the Carson Trail, as does Councilmember Mary Cheh. The FCCA board also supports the trail naming and the Palisades association and ANC 3D are expected to consider the proposal.

Immediate Opening for Advertising Sign Vigilante

I am turning over the unofficial job I appointed to myself a couple of years ago: Removing those small ugly 18 x 24 inch corrugated plastic signs on little metal legs or attached to trees that periodically pop up in the neighborhood. For-profit companies post them illegally in public spaces—this is not allowed by city signage and advertising rules. We could report them to the city and ask the city to remove them, but by far the most effective, fastest and tax-dollar-saving method of keeping their number down and deterring the practice is to promptly remove them ourselves. I invite a new sign vigilante to take up the task of promptly removing illegal signs. [It is completely legal to post signs for neighborhood events like yard sales and parties, lost kitties, and realtors are allowed to post for open houses under strict rules. Note: The correct place to put up legal community notices are on telephone poles and lamp posts.
