Minutes from FCCA Meeting 03/20/13

FCCA President, Bob Avery, opened the meeting. He discussed the letter

sent from the FCCA Board to the DC Office of Planning concerning the proposed changes to the DC Zoning laws. See the March, 2013 Foxhall News (back page) for issues of concern. Bob stated that no position relative to zoning changes would be taken by the FCCA Board before the matter was brought to the members for a vote.

Police officer Anthony McElwee spoke to the group about the current crime report. There have been eight property crimes of late in our area. Three of the crimes were burglaries; entry made by unlocked doors or windows. One burglary resulted in a theft of \$11,000. Officer McElwee stressed that these crimes were preventable had the houses been more secure.

Officer McElwee responded to an audience member who voiced concerns about unleashed dogs and dog waste left on Hardy Field. He said that he would authorize some police drive by's of the field and would give tickets as appropriate.

Members were encouraged to email Officer McElwee at (anthony.mcelwee@dc.gov) for house checks when one goes on vacation.

FCCA Board member, Conrad DeWitte, reported on the Georgetown University Steering Group that is part of the Georgetown Community Partnership. There are five working groups: noise, trash, transportation, metrics, and communication. Homeowners are encouraged to call the Noisy Student Hotline (SNAP)

Councilwoman Mary Cheh, Ward 3 representative from the DC City Council, spoke to the group about some of her initiatives in the areas of transportation, the environment, and motor vehicles, including the taxi commission. Two of her areas of concentration have been the Capital Bikeshare and "Car2Go" programs. Some residents voiced objections to the number of "Car2Go" cars left on the streets of Foxhall Village. Ms. Cheh also asked the group for input on the best spot for a bike station in our area.

The remainder of the meeting was dedicated to Ms. Cheh answering questions from members of the audience. Much of the discussion focused on the proposed changes to the DC Zoning laws.

Foxhall Real Estate Corner

The biggest ongoing factor driving the real estate market in Washington is inventory. Bottom line is that there is a scarcity of homes for sale. Comparing inventory, February 2013 to February 2012, inventory in Washington, DC is down 35%. This of course has some effect on prices, but interestingly, people have remained cautious and picky in their home purchases. Buyers are still seeking homes that are in a ready to move in to condition. This creates a divided market, with nice homes selling very rapidly, even with multiple offers, and homes needing more attention remaining on the market for extended periods. Banks have hardened their lending guidelines, making the market a bit more difficult to navigate and keeping some buyers out of the market, particularly first time home buyers.

If you are a potential seller this is a good time for you. The market remained uncharacteristically strong through the winter and is looking very promising for spring. A nice, well maintained home, priced correctly should sell quickly.

Here are some interesting statistics from our very local real estate market.

In 2012 there were 32 sales that ranged between \$615,000 and \$2,275,000. This included 5 sales over a million. The median price of a home was \$850,000. The new development on Macarthur Blvd, Foxhall Ridge, had an additional 12 sales ranging from \$952,000 to \$1,708,000 with most hovering at or right above a million. There was one sale of a non-historic home on the 4400 block of P Street that resulted in a tear down and the construction of a new house.

In 2011 there were 43 sales that ranged from \$600,000 to \$2,795,000 with 12 sales over a million.

The median price of a home was \$839,000.

Remembering Longtime Foxhall Village Resident Joanne Hebb Belk

SAMUEL "Q" BELK

Joanne Hebb Belk, Long-time Washington Resident, and NIH FOI Director

Joanne Hebb Belk passed away peacefully at her home at Wheelock Terrace in Hanover, New Hampshire at 9:00 pm on March 4th, 2013.

Mrs. Belk was born to Edwin Elijah Hebb and Louise Whiting Hebb on June 8th, 1923 in Detroit, Michigan. Her father was an engineer in the Michigan State Bell Telephone company and retired as a Colonel from the Air Force Reserve. Her mother, Louise, was a women's physical fitness instructor who died from pneumonia in 1929. Joanne and her siblings, Edwin and Louise were sent to live with relatives in Hingham, and later Framingham, Massachusetts. Joanne graduated from Framingham Academy and High School in June 1940 and spent summers and free time writing and editing for Boston area newspapers: the Framingham News and the Bostonian. She served as a summer field worker at the Gardner Farm in Wiscassett. Maine in the summer of 1943 and 1944. It was there that she was first introduced to the Maine Seacoast and in later life was a supporter of the Chewonki Foundation. She attended Simmons College and received her B.S. in June 1944 and immediately entered the Women's Army Corp (WAC) and was promoted to Second Lieutenant in November 1944. She served as the Public Relations officer at the Thomas M. England Hospital in New Jersey. It was there that she met her future husband, Samuel E. Belk III, who was recovering from wounds and an amputation received in the Normandy Campaign and while a prisoner of the Germans. In 1946, under the auspices of the GI Bill, Joanne travelled to and

studied in Germany, Sweden, and Switzerland for one year in the American Students Abroad Program. She returned to the United States to write on the staff of the Boston Herald and was married to Mr. Belk on September 8th, 1949 at the Old Ship Church in Hingham, Massachusetts. The newly married couple then travelled to London where Mr. Belk was enrolled as a student at the University of London and LSE and Joanne worked for the War Relief Agency of the US Government. They then spent a year in Berkeley, California where Mr. Belk completed his Masters in Slavic Studies. In 1952 they moved to Washington D.C. where they would remain for over half a century.

In 1955, Joanne gave birth to her only child, Samuel "Q" Belk. Her marriage to Mr. Belk ended in divorce in 1961, but both continued in close contact until his death in 2007. In 1967 she joined the staff of Science Magazine as an editor, received her paralegal certification from George Washington University in 1975, and, in 1977, began a twenty-year career with the National Institutes of Health (NIH) as Director of Freedom of Information. She retired after 21 years, in 1998, at the age of 75. She continued to live in her house of 46 years in Foxhall Village until 2008. She relocated to Hanover, New Hampshire to be closer to her son, daughter-in-law, and grandchildren. Her last years were spent in the warm environs of Wheelock Terrace in Hanover.

Throughout her life Joanne Belk was a fierce believer in the benefits of the highest quality education for others, even while she was largely unable to afford or take advantage of them herself, growing up during the latter years of the Depression and the Second World War. In her teens, while living with relatives, she pushed

her younger brother into Phillips
Exeter Academy, which eventually
led to a degree at MIT. Likewise she
enabled her son to study at St. Paul's
School, Dartmouth, and Stanford; her
grandchildren followed at St. Paul's.
She travelled widely: to Africa,
Europe, and Asia, often with her best
friend, Marilie "Mouse" Rockefeller
of Washington who passed away in
2005. Both loved and attended the
opera.

She is survived by her son, Samuel ("Q"), daughter-in-law Sherry
Thornburg, and two grandchildren
Samuel Ellison ("Jonah") and Anna
Elizabeth. She was pre-deceased by
her younger brother Edwin, a life-long
employee of General Motors and her
older sister Louise of Brea, California.

BZA Meetings

Zoning regulations allow private schools to operate in residential neighborhoods so long as the schools are not likely to become objectionable in terms of noise, traffic, number of students or other conditions. The Board of Zoning Adjustment typically requires private schools to hold quarterly meetings with their communities. That provides an opportunity for neighbors to express concerns and schools to address them. There is the option of filing a complaint with the Office of Zoning if meetings are unsuccessful in providing a satisfactory resolution. Here are the dates for the May meetings:
