FCCA Agenda: April Meeting

The next FCCA general membership meeting will be held on Wednesday, April 16th, at 7PM at the Hardy Rec Center, 45th & Q. In addition to our regular police report the meeting will feature updates on the German Embassy construction and Georgetown University Student-Community partnership program. The main topic of the meeting will be a panel discussion with experts focused on the likely future development paths for the MacArthur Blvd corridor and the FCCA area in general. The Safeway renovation, Riverside Hospital development and several new proposals for lower MacArthur are likely to be the first of many new developments for our area. Historically we as an association have been "reactive" in responding to development. The panel discussion is our opportunity to become more "proactive" and to anticipate the likely future changes in our area. All are welcome at the meeting. We look forward to seeing you on the 16th.

Your Home and the Danger of Carbon Monoxide

Recently there was a case of high carbon monoxide levels in a neighborhood home which made the owner ill. Fortunately the levels didn't reach a level as to do more serious harm. Carbon monoxide is an odorless gas, which, in excess quantity can be deadly. In our homes it is a byproduct of burning gas or oil for heat, or for hot water. Most of our homes were built in the 20s and 30s with terracotta chimney liners designed to draw the gas off. In three of the past five cases in our community, chimney liners have decomposed and dropped terracotta pieces down the chimney flue to block the designed escape of gas which then escapes into the homes.

It is important to have your chimney inspected periodically. If you have never done so it might be wise to do so. Having your furnace and boiler serviced periodically is also important. Two of the five incidences I spoke of involved older boilers with defective parts.

Everyone should have smoke detectors in your home on every floor. It would be wise to also have a carbon monoxide detector in your home. Carbon monoxide is lighter than air and will go to higher spaces, so good locations are on the basement ceiling or at the top of the basement stairs. If you have someone living in your basement I would most strongly recommend this be done.

FCCA Meeting Minutes: Highlights - 02/19/2014

<u>Police Report</u>- Lt. Eric Hayes and Officer Anthony McElwee presented.

Crime is down 18%. People are encouraged to keep cars, houses, and garage doors locked at all times. Do not keep garage door opener in your car.

Zoning Issues: The ANC is reviewing the following concerns:

Corner shops- The historic character of the row-house portion of our community (which is zoned R4 and is mostly protected as an historic district) would be significantly impacted by the allowance of corner stores or other commercial uses. As a community there is near universal opposition to this.

Reducing parking requirements- We already have an overabundance of cars in our neighborhood. New construction along MacArthur Boulevard and the new Safeway would increase density as a "matter of right" which would only make the parking problem worse.

Apartments over Garages- The new plan would allow apartment garages to be built as a "matter of right". One of our major concerns being in close proximity to a university is oversaturation by group houses. This allowance seems like a back door way to pack more students into rental housing. This new "matter of right" would apply to all homes in the FCCA area.

Basement apartments-This new plan would allow basement apartments throughout the FCCA area to be built as a "matter of right". Clearly, this would lead to pressure for additional front entrances as well as full height basement egress windows on front facades. This allowance would also be a significant threat to the character defining elements of our historic district. Additionally, we fear this would allow investors to divide houses into multiple units and thereby increase the number of unrelated

individuals who could legally live in a house, increasing pressure to create more group houses and negatively impacting our quality of life.

FCCA will draft a letter in support of the ANC positions.

Councilwoman Mary Cheh- Ward 3 City Councilwoman, Mary Cheh, who is running for reelection, spoke to the group. Ms. Cheh has been concentrating on many issues relative to creating a Transportation Authority as well as measures to address the city's homeless population.

Lab School Lease- The request by the Lab School for an extension to twenty-five years on their lease at the Hardy School campus is not currently on the table. The city is in the process of determining if DCPS would have future need for the Hardy School or will decide that the school will be designated as "surplus", thus allowing Lab School to move forward on the lease extension.

Our thanks were expressed to Councilwoman Cheh for her annual presentation to the FCCA.

Neighborhood Safety Update

According to our crime liaison, unlike Chevy Chase, we have not had any burglaries that have occurred while citizens are home. Even so, Chevy Chase police have warned, not to open the door to solicitors, or people asking to do work of any kind, or claiming to have a problem, such as needing to call a tow truck. Keep all doors and windows locked. Leave porch lights and backdoor lights on all night. Please be sure to relay these precautionary measures to your children and babysitter. In addition, given the sexual assault in Glover-Archbold, residents are advised to be alert and practice precautionary measures.
