Georgetown University & Hospital Construction Update

Our thanks and appreciation to the representatives from both Georgetown University and the Medstar Georgetown University Hospital who attended our January FCCA Meeting and gave presentations and updates on the various construction projects, particularly the new Surgical Pavilion.

The new traffic light on Reservoir Road at Entrance #2 to the Hospital seems to be functioning smoothly and fewer delays are occurring. They have requested that DDOT reestablish the right lane No Parking for a group of parking slots to create a right turn lane near the entrance, and are awaiting the DDOT response.

Pedestrians will notice that the sidewalk on the south side of Reservoir between Entrance #1 and the Cloisters residential area is closed for the month of March. Those walking can cross Reservoir to the north side at the traffic lights on both 37th and 38th Streets.

Additionally, in the coming weeks you will notice more construction at both Entrance #1 and #4. Details will be issued as soon as they are available.

These cover most of Foxhall Village (which encompasses almost 400 homes), but not the entire FCCA. These are mostly people who attended the Neighborhood Watch meeting that Samanta Nolan, from the DC Government, ran after an unusual rash of crimes in our area prompted me to contact her that year. If someone outside Foxhall Village would like to be a Block Captain for another street, I'm happy to add you to the list (MalloryLawsonASID@msn.com). Police reports and arrests are forwarded to me every day, and I, in turn, forward them to these people. Thanks so much to these safety minded volunteers who help keep our area one of the safest in DC. In a perfect world, every FCCA block would have a Captain, they would have every home on that block on their email list, and we would all be in touch with each other for any unusual activity, notices of vacation times, emergencies, etc. The more we know our neighbors and communicate with each other, the safer we will all be.

The reality is that 75 to 80 percent of crimes are preventable just by locking up. Most crimes are due to unlocked doors in both homes and cars. Also, leaving back packs, purses, computers, gifts, etc. in plain view in cars is an invitation for theft. There are easy to install and inexpensive devices available at hardware stores to help prevent crimes in homes, and numerous companies in the crime prevention business. Having a dog, outside lights (on a motion detector and/ or timer), and outside cameras are also good deterrents. Crimes happen at all hours and a surprising number during the day (it's their day job).

Dog Park Survey Results and Next Steps

I am happy to report that the interminable Hardy Park Dog Park survey is complete. We launched the online survey on November 11, 2018, added paper door hangers/postcards in early 2019, and finally closed the survey to respondents on March 3, 2019. Post-processing included some time eliminating duplicate entries. Our apologies to those who diligently completed the survey multiple times, but we can only accept one per person. Even after removing duplicates, we have 320 unique, valid, and thoughtful responses. Often postcards came back smudged or scribbly, but in all cases but one respondents were reached to proof their answers, ensure identity, etc. Only one mail-in postcard arrived with no identification on it, so that had to be discarded since we could not verify its source. That person's card, by the way, was a Strong Yes.

We have published the final anonymized survey results as a PDF at www.HardyParkDogs.org.

The split for the 320 final votes is as follows:

Strong No:	8.1%
No:	5.6%
Neutral:	5%
Yes:	41.3%
Strong Yes:	40%
Totals:	100%

In total: 81.3% of respondents voted in favor of a dog park.

There were a few votes that came in from Arlington, Virginia, distributed

across the for-to-against spectrum. At least at this time we are considering their votes to support goodwill and reciprocity. Similarly, a few votes came in from the far eastern sides of Georgetown, where the respondents might have several park options before ever arriving at Hardy, but since they were mainly against the park, and there was such a shortage of against votes, we have kept them as well.

If nothing else, the results suggest that at least those willing to participate in the survey would overwhelmingly be in favor of a dog park. We all have to understand that some opponents to the park may have chosen to not actively participate in the survey, but it is clear just from the Strong Yes responses that it is worth advancing the concept.

Here are some of the next steps we expect:

1. Respond to feedback on the published results. Again, the published anonymized results can be found at http://www/hardyparkdogs.org.

2. Consult with Peter Nohrden and his team at DPR on their recommended next steps, including:

1. Seek guidance on the differences between Dog Parks and the still vaguely defined Dog Runs.

2. Determine/Elicit the points of contact known by DPR for each of the approved dog parks in DC. (They do not appear to be published on any DC.gov website resource.)

3. Elicit Do's and Don't's as well as What We Would Do Differently for each of the current approved dog parks' representative groups. Hopefully they will provide a balanced view of what has worked for them and what has led to frustration by their respective neighborhoods.

4. Seek volunteers to comprise a Hardy Park Dogs group/org to formal-

ly represent for and maintain any dog park that might emerge.

5. Begin to elicit recommended self-regulated rules for any park that might emerge (e.g., restricted hours, sophisticated means to ensure adherence to rules, additional services to ensure waste or odor does not ill-affect nearby residents).

GU Hospital Excavation Ahead; New 2D Commander

Excavation for of the new MedStar Georgetown University Hospital tower on the east side of the campus is expected to begin in late spring or early summer and construction of a new east-west campus road is underway, according to hospital and GU officials.

Addressing the January 23, 2019 Foxhall Community Citizens Association membership meeting, they said utilities have been moved in preparation for the work and that dump trucks would begin to flow in and out of the site, using Reservoir Road.

A new traffic light has been installed at the entrance to the emergency room and another will be installed temporarily at the eastern most campus gate, near 37thStreet to control traffic. They said another traffic light, anticipated to be permanent, is to be installed at the gate on the far west side of campus, abutting Glover Archbold National Park. campus to use the far west gate, using a new east-west connector to carry vehicles between the center of the campus and the park border, about even with Q Street in Foxhall Village. The increased traffic will run along the park border, where there now is a parking lot access lane, and link to Reservoir Road. Residents voiced concern about the impact of the road on the park, including light from vehicles. The pitch of the road would mean westbound vehicle lights would be pointing downward on the approach to the park, a GU official said.

Regarding Hardy Park, Peter Nohrden of the D.C. Parks and Recreation Department was on hand to give an update on plans for a \$5.2 million renovation. He said the park design contract was awarded to IStudio Architects of D.C., which has completed other recreation center projects in the city. The company was one of two bidders, Nohrden said.

In other action, Foxhall Village resident Howard Bray proposed that the Hardy Park field house be named for Carl Richard Wilson, Jr. Wilson grew up nearby, honed his basketball skills at the Hardy court, went on to play at American University and then was sent as Marine second lieutenant to Vietnam, where he was killed in March 1969. FCCA members backed the proposal, which faces review by city officials. The basketball court was dedicated to Wilson in 2002 and a commemorative plaque was installed at the court gate.

Metropolitan Police Lieutenant Darren Haskis reported several thefts from automobiles and urged people not to leave valuables in their cars. Covering a purse with a towel is probably not good enough and neither is putting a newspaper over a laptop computer, Haskis said. Duncan Bedlion, appointed in January 2019 as Commander of MPD Second District, which spans much of Northwest Washington, stopped by the meeting to introduce himself. Bedlion, who moved to D.C. in 1999, holds an undergraduate degree in political science and a master's degree in professional studies in security and safety leadership, both awarded by George Washington University. His prior assignment was commander of the department's Youth and Family Services Division, and previous duties included managing detectives and criminal investigation and sexual assault units.

The FCCA board gained another member, Edward Ponzi, who lives in Foxhall Village.

Earnest Money At Risk In GDS Campus Sale

The buyer of Georgetown Day School's MacArthur Boulevard campus can still back out of the deal, but earnest money now in escrow would be forfeited, according to GDS Project Manager Kristina Lennox.

Lennox's update on the sale, which has been in the works since at least December 2017, came March 5 in a regular quarterly meeting with community members. Lennox did not say the amount of earnest money at risk.

Property inspections are complete and transfer of title to the buyer is expected in June 2020, according to Lennox. GDS then will move its lower and middle school to Tenleytown, where the upper school campus is being expanded.

Many nearby residents have been eager to know the fate of the school site at the east end of MacArthur Boulevard. GDS has identified the buyer as another private school, but not given the name. GDS officials have said that their enrollment at the PK-8 site is capped at 575.

Unstable Ground By Park

Sinkholes around storm water and sewer pipes at the intersection of Reservoir Road and Glover Archbold National Park drew the attention of a DC Water maintenance crew on Wednesday, Feb. 27, 2019. Nearby horizontal collection systems connect at the site and then spill into a nearly 40-foot deep vertical, brick-lined pipe that connects to a large main that runs under the center of the park en route to the city's sewage treatment facility. The crew planned to check for cracks in the pipe that might drain and destabilize surrounding soil.

Dear Mayor Bowser:

The Foxhall Community Citizens Association (FCCA) board of directors is very concerned that the present "Keep Hardy Public" effort will lead to driving the current occupant—the LAB School—out of the Hardy School property for no good purpose. For forty years D.C. Public Schools has shown no interest in using the Hardy School as a public school, and we believe this to be the case still. If a study of the use of Hardy School as a public elementary school is contemplated, we are very interested that it not be drawn out so as to make the space unattractive to the LAB School for its continued occupancy. The worst outcome would be Hardy School becoming a vacant building that is a blight on our neighborhood rather than being used as either a public or private elementary school.

Constructed in the 1930s as the Foxhall Village School, Hardy School sits almost at the center of the FCCA's boundaries and was our neighborhood's local public elementary school until the 1970s. Since its closing as a public elementary school, the property has been used first as home to the Rock Creek International School and in subsequent years as the LAB School, an institution with a mission of providing a rigorous academic experience for students with learning disabilities. Over many years FCCA members have worked with the LAB School, and we are happy to report that they have been a good neighbor.

The FCCA represents the neighbors who would be most impacted by any change to the current beneficial use of Hardy School by the LAB School. Hence, the discussions about the future of the Hardy School building must include the FCCA in a key way.
