2020 Visitor Parking Program Passes (VPP)

Many streets in the FCCA are covered by the DC Department of Transportation's residential parking program. Many residents pay for the additional Zone 3 RPP designation when registering vehicles in order to park in excess of the two hour limits widely signed in our area.

The VPP program is designed to allow legitimate visitors to park on residential parking only streets and alleviate the burden at the district police stations caused by residents requesting the two week visitor passes

Residents can register for the 2020 VPP beginning November 12, 2019 (<https://ddot.dc.gov/service/visitor-parking-passes>). VPPs can only be requested online and are mailed (at no cost) to residents, in FCCA's case ANC

City Comprehensive Plan In Flux

The D.C. Office of Planning has posted for public review the draft amended Comprehensive Plan, a more than 1,000-page document that guides development across the city.

"There are major changes in all the chapters," Erkin Ozberk, senior neighborhood planner in the Office of Planning, told the ANC 3D Commission in October.

Commission Chair Elkins said a novel would make better reading but encouraged residents to go through the document.

"We're counting on people in neighborhoods to identify issues and let us know," Elkins said. ANC resolutions will be considered January 8, 2020. The D.C. Council is the ultimate arbiter of the contents.

Ozberk said planners have been trying to remove contradictory elements of the plan. He said the text of the plan would be highlighted to preserve deletions and additions to make changes easier to recognize.

The 20-year plan, adopted in 2006 and previously amended in 2011, covers matters such as land use, economic development, housing, environmental protection, historic preservation and transportation. Related documents have been posted at plandc.dc.gov.

ANC 3D is part of Rock Creek West, which nearly matches Ward 3, where planners project the population to swell from 92,399 to 113,151 by 2045. The proportion of children and seniors is rising.

Ozberk said there's a goal of adding 36,000 housing units, with 12,000 dedicated as "affordable" and distributed equitably across the city. ANCs will have 90 days to submit resolutions on the

plan, Ozberk said.

Commissioner Troy Kravitz called the timetable "suboptimal" for digestion and action. (This article first appeared in Potomac Times.)

Washington Gas Blames Corrosion For Leaks

The scent of gas has tainted the air in places along 44th Street recently, drawing repair crews from Washington Gas.

"We responded immediately to investigate each report and to conduct repairs where necessary," said Bernie Tylor, company media relations manager. "The cause was determined to be corrosion."

Tylor said October 29 that two residential service lines were replaced. The lines were near Volta Place and 44th Street and in the 1600 block of 44th Street, according to Tylor.

Tylor said anyone who thinks they smell natural gas should call 844 WASHGAS (844-927-4427), first, and then 911, right away. Tylor said the company "responds each and every time, 24x7."

Changes to FCCA Groups

GW Mt. Vernon Campus Update

At a community meeting on October 24, Kevin Days, GW Director of Community Relations, gave an update on the next five year university plan, to take effect in 2021. No details will be available until early 2020, because new GW University leadership is just starting the process of “reimagining” the Foggy Bottom and Mt. Vernon campus, given the planned reduction in student population by 20% (from 12,000 to 10,000). At this point there is no discussion of selling the Mt. Vernon campus; one possibility is cutting some programs, to better define what GW is “known for”. The University also hopes to reduce class sizes and make it easier for students to get in the class of their choice.

In terms of interim changes to the campus, GW will install more lighting for safety purposes on the Mt. Vernon campus; the lighting will be facing internally and hopefully will not affect neighbors.

GW officials noted that there are several campus activities to which neighbors are invited, including a weekly Sunday brunch in the cafeteria (West Hall, Pelham Commons): all you can eat for \$15 from 10am to 3pm on Sundays. We can also use the cafeteria other times. In addition there are planned movies and holiday celebrations. These activities are handled by the new Assistant Dean of Students, Greg Rheault: grheault@gwu.edu

Since the meeting there was an incident involving the Vern express buses between the Foggy Bottom campus and Mount Vernon. Because of heightened security concerns, neighbors now wanting to use these buses will need to show identification, such as a drivers license.

Thanks for Contribution to Foxhall Village Historical Archives

Long-time resident Gary Groat was cleaning up and found a set of reproducible (sepias) drawings for several homes along lower 44th Street. Mr. Groat obtained the plans from the original architect of lower Foxhall Village, Waverly Taylor, in late 1970s. Rather than toss them in the trash, Mr. Groat thought that the FCCA may want them to add to its archives.

Because the sepias can be reproduced some of the homeowners covered by the plans may be interested in obtaining a copy. Mr. Groat found them useful when remodeling his first house in Foxhall Village, 1510 44th Street.

Additionally, Mr. Groat found an original bound copy of the January 1937 copy of the Good Housekeeping magazine that featured Foxhall Village as “Good Design in Group Housing,” which he purchased in 1976. During the application process to make Foxhall Village a historic district, Mr. Groat provided a copy of the article, but not the original.

These documents have been given to Paul DonVito for safe keeping. Thank you, Gary!

Don’t Leave Out the Welcome Mat ... for criminals!

The following crime prevention tips were relevant in the mid-1970’s when I was an MPD Reserve Officer working out of the Community Services Division of the Second District, were just as relevant when I retired 26 years later as the Deputy Chief of Patrol Operations for the Fairfax County Police Department and without the benefit of consulting with my fellow colleagues-in-blue should still be practical today.

I’m an “avid” walker around the FCCA community and I cannot tell you, particularly during this time of year with early sunsets, how obvious it is that no one is home at your and your neighbors’ homes. Darkened homes, no porch lights, a collection of newspapers or mail are all ‘screaming’ to potential burglars, “Look! No one’s home here!”

Buy an inexpensive timer and set a couple of table lamps to come on before sunset in the living areas of your house. Keep your front porch light on... 24-hours a day! How inexpensive is it with today’s LED bulbs to ensure your porch area is lighted and your house numbers can be seen by public safety responders? About \$6/year! (there are calculators on-line to compare the cost to purchase and operate LED vs. CFL vs. incandescent bulbs...). Many people these days use their back doors and forget to look around their front porch areas for: light on? delivered mail/packages/flyers/door-hangs? accumulating newspapers?

NEST, Ring and other wifi-connected devices are great for real-time surveillance (who does that?) or after-the-fact evidence gathering (too little, too late!) but nothing says “We are home! Go to another location!” than that lived in look. Also, keep those bushes and shrubbery trimmed back particularly near windows and access points. Unkempt vegetation is a great cover for criminal activity. And, as touched on earlier, be sure your house number are prominently displayed and easily seen from the street. Ask any cop or firefighter how difficult is to “guestimate” the address of someone calling 9-1-1 and struggling to find the exact address.

Georgetown Construction Updates

- Hopefully you've noticed that No Parking restrictions on the south side of Reservoir between the Dental School and Entrance #2 are again in place between 9:30 a.m. and noon on weekdays! As a result, there are far fewer traffic backups.
- It has been suggested the time be extended through the afternoon however, it took so long to get the current signs that we don't know if this will be implemented

Plans include:

- New playground equipment designed for ages 2-5 and 5-12, including a 12-foot tower and enclosed slide that accommodates handicapped children and shelters that can serve as escapes for children with "sensory processing disorders" who become overwhelmed. The ground cover will be engineered wood fiber, hardwood milled so that it doesn't cause splinters. A resident suggested that picnic tables be added to the playground.
- A 7,500 square foot dog park with a stone dust surface, located beside the tennis courts. It would be the only location where dogs would be allowed to be off the leash. The Department of Parks and Recreation's Peter Nohrden said he hoped it would take people with dogs off the field. The city does not clean dog parks, a duty required of the community dog park manager. Nohrden said the city has 12 dog parks and they are kept clean. But he said the S Street dog park near DuPont Circle, outfitted with artificial turf, does smell.
- Leveling of the big sports field.
- Creation of a splash pad. Nohrden said water waste at the pad would be mitigated by requiring that users touch a button every 15 minutes to keep the flow to the water features, such as overhead dumping-buckets.
- Enclosure of the field house porch, making an all-season room, with garage-type doors to open during warm weather. Nohrden said the city Department of Energy and Environment might be able to help with use of solar panels for power.
- A picnic pavilion, with a green roof made of plantings such as sedums. Once the plantings are established, apparently, not much maintenance is required.

- A water line with a spigot is to be extended to the community garden plots, which will be fenced.

Some of the costs have been adjusted. For example, the splash pad, previously estimated at \$400,000 to \$750,000, is now estimated at \$350,000 to \$500,000. Etherton said the feature would be on the "lower side of that." Nohrden said funding for ongoing maintenance of the Park comes from a different budget, not the capital spending for the renovation.

Nohrden said that the sixth goal at Hardy Park's Carl Wilson memorial basketball court, lost in the \$500,000 renovation of parts of the Park in 2015-17, could be replaced as part of the current project.

A bike share station is not part of the Hardy Park renovation, but a possible site might be on the Q Street side of the tennis courts, according to Nohrden. He said it is level there and could accommodate a station.

MPD Officer Anthony McElwee told FCCA members that he had been busy on MacArthur Boulevard, writing 269 tickets since August 1. Ward Circle traffic circulation, with the addition of new control mechanisms, such as lane guides, seems to have become more lawful. McElwee said his patrols in the past took one or two times around the circle to catch a violator. It now might take five or 10 circuits. Nearby, however, on a Nebraska Avenue crosswalk at American University, a flashing red light has made for murky motoring for some.

"There is a sign there that tells you what to do," one resident said. "But it's still confusing."

McElwee explained the control, but added that not everyone gets it.

area 3D. A VPP allows any vehicle which does not have a Zone 3 decal to display a 3D VPP while parking in the area and be exempt from the two hour restriction.

Who Can Use the Pass: Any visitor may use a Pass from an eligible resident. Visitors include your guests or commercial vehicles actively engaged at a residence.

Parking Enforcement, and many residents in the Village, have noticed a significant increase in the number of vehicles displaying VPP passes, particularly on streets closest to Reservoir Road. Parking Enforcement suggests that residents are giving their VPP passes to non-visitors as these vehicles are regularly parked in the neighborhood; the officers can't ticket a vehicle displaying a current 3D VPP pass unless it has been altered.

As a courtesy to your neighbors, please use your 2020 VPP for legitimate guests to your residence. Please do not give or loan your pass to anyone not actively engaged at your residence.

Finally, know your neighbors. There used to be a crime prevention PSA on TV that said [neighbors looking out a window at a moving van...] "The Smiths didn't know the Jones were moving...neither did the Joneses!" Hey, you may not want to hang out or socialize with your neighbors but at least try to have their names and contact information handy. We always promoted the idea of a "+" concept: Picture your house in the middle then share names and phone numbers with the occupants on either side of you (left & right), across the street from you and across the alley from you – four in all. With this information in hand, there should never be a case like the one illustrated above. The FCCA area is a relatively crime-free area (occasional thefts from autos and an occasional larceny) but if you watched the news recently, while homicides and violent crime are relatively low in the District, quality-of-life crimes are on the increase. Let's help, in a neighborly way, to reverse that trend and make our community a safe and welcoming one.
