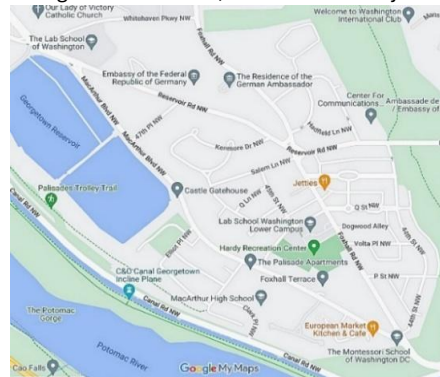

MacArthur High School Renamed and Expanded

On Aug. 24, Mayor Muriel Bowser, other DC officials, and community members celebrated the first day of school and the completion of a \$91 million expansion to the school. **MacArthur High School has been renamed John R. Thompson Jr. High School (JRTHS)**, honoring Thompson who was a Washingtonian educator, Georgetown basketball coach, and civil rights activist.

The new 33,000-square-foot building includes new science classrooms, new art and music rooms, administrative space, technology-equipped learning spaces, and an outdoor classroom. DCPS says that the next phase of expansion will include a new auditorium and expanded cafeteria space and is scheduled for completion in August 2028. The expanded school will permit an increase in enrollment from 200 (in SY 2023-24) to up to 800 students.

Crime Report

There have been only 20 crime reports issued for the first eight months of 2026 in Census Tract 8.02, which closely corresponds to the Lower Foxhall and MacArthur neighborhoods served by the FCCA. These 20 incidents represent only 0.0014% of the 14,050 reported for the District as a whole and 24% of the 85 incident reports for ANC3D.

Since our April newsletter, there have been only 9 crime reports for incidents in Census Tract (8.02). On April 14th, a resident's car was stolen in the 4400 block of Q Street. At the May 6th ANC3D meeting, Officer McElwee (our traffic and safety officer) did not report on the status of the stolen vehicle.

At the June 3rd ANC meeting, Officer McElwee discussed the armed robbery that took place on May 12th at 4:14PM at the intersection of MacArthur Blvd. and Elliot Place. A juvenile (a student at JRTHS) and an adult female robbed a victim at gunpoint and a backpack was taken. According to McElwee, the juvenile was identified but the adult female was not (as of June 3rd). The juvenile could not be arrested until the incident was taken before a judge to request that an arrest warrant be issued. (MPD must submit a custody order for juveniles to the Office of the Attorney General (OAG), which must approve it and send it to a judge who will decide whether to approve the order to issue an arrest warrant.) At the July 1st ANC meeting, Officer McElwee reported that the custody order had not yet been approved. At the September meeting, he reported that the suspect had been arrested.

Regarding the thefts from vehicles, Officer McElwee always reminds residents to lock their vehicles and not leave any items of value in plain view.

Public Safety Issues and JR Thompson High School

Public safety issues involving students attending JR Thompson High School (JRTHS) have been discussed at numerous ANC3D meetings. Residents have raised concerns about students hiding guns, other weapons, or drugs in neighborhood yards; drug deals, students smoking pot around the neighborhood, as well as verbal and physical abuse. A resident in the Laverock neighborhood reported that residents have even received verbal threats from some parents who insist on using Laverock RD. as a pickup or drop off area for their students. Another resident reported a gathering of 50 or so students in late May at around 10PM in the Charleston Terrace/Indian Rock neighborhood (near the intersection of Foxhall and Reservoir Roads). An MPD officer responded to a call and the group was dispersed without incident.

At the September ANC meeting, residents brought up an August 26th incident where they observed a student hiding what turned out to be a gun in a yard on the 4500 block of Q Street. When the gun was located, police were called who took the gun and started a police report. Residents captured a video of the student who came to retrieve the gun after the school day, and Principal McCray identified the student. Officer McElwee was aware of the incident but had no further information to report.

On September 4th, Commissioner Nowalk posted information about the large police presence near JRTHS that morning. No crime was committed in the area. Police were seeking a student identified as owning a car present at a downtown disturbance the previous evening where a gun was reported (not fired). Working with JRTHS leaders, MPD detained the student and his passenger and searched the car. No guns were found on either the occupants or in the vehicle. No arrests were made.

Discussions at ANC meetings have shed light on factors that are making it difficult to address student-related public safety concerns. Participants from DCPS say that school personnel cannot take actions when the offenses take place off campus. The high school does not have the staff to monitor students who are out in nearby neighborhoods during school hours (Principal McCray has requested more staff). Although MPD says that residents should call police to report public safety incidents, some residents are hesitant to call police, fearing retribution. When a crime involving a juvenile is reported, MPD is

limited to the extent to which they can act on the incident unless an officer actually witnesses the incident (as noted in the case of armed robbery discussed above in the **Crime Report**). Residents have complained that MPD officers do not act when they do observe student smoking marijuana.

Principal McCray stated that the public safety problems are associated with a small number of students. Commissioner Chuck Elkins (ANC3D01) proposed having the ANC collect information about student-related public safety incidents. In the meantime, commissioners said that constituents should feel free to email them when there are incidents.

Residents have long expressed their desire for more comprehensive information. In the absence of accurate data on the frequency and types of incidents occurring and the actions that are taken when incidents are reported, public perceptions are based on anecdotal information—which is often second-hand. Moreover, increases in the student population from 200 in SY2023-24 to around 670 this fall have increased perceptions of public safety risks. ANC3D Approves St Patrick's Plan to Build New Middle School

At the September ANC3D meeting, Commissioners voted 7 to 0 in favor of supporting St Patrick's Episcopal Day School's BZA application to build a new middle school on Whitehaven PKWY. St Patrick's is requesting an enrollment cap of 550 students at the expanded campus who will be served by 140 faculty and staff members. The ANC and St. Patrick's leaders worked together to come up with a plan to mitigate traffic volumes that could negatively impact Foxhall Rd. and MacArthur Blvd. traffic. It includes a new pick-up and drop-off configuration which allows vehicles to enter Whitehaven PKWY from both MacArthur Blvd. and Foxhall Rd. Hopefully, this plan will reduce traffic backups on Foxhall Road.

Georgetown University Seeks Changes in Enrollment Caps

Georgetown University (GU) is seeking a modification to its campus plan regarding student enrollment caps. At the September ANC meeting, GU representative Cory Peterson outlined the changes, emphasizing that proposed modifications were agreed upon among members of the Georgetown Community Partnership (GCP), which includes University personnel, ANC commissioners, and neighborhood community groups (including the FCCA). The school is asking to lift its undergraduate enrollment cap for its main campus by 100 students (from the current limit of 6,675) which will be offset by lower postgraduate student enrollment. The current enrollment cap (agreed upon by the GCP) of 14,106 total students at its main campus has not changed.

Mr. Peterson outlined steps the university is taking to mitigate any adverse impacts of its student population on nearby neighborhoods. The limit on the number of students who can live off campus remains at 970. If the number of students living off-campus exceeds 970, the expanded undergraduate cap will be reduced commensurately until the number of off-campus students drops down below the 970 threshold. The school is also taking steps to reduce the number of student vehicles parked in adjacent neighborhoods--which is prohibited by the university--for example by implementing a monitoring system that uses automated license plate readers to identify students who have violated this rule.

The school is also seeking an expansion of the Medical School enrollment cap by 80 students over the next four years (to 910). To address the possible impact of these students driving and parking in the neighborhood, the

school will make more on-campus parking available to medical school students.

Note: Parking in our neighborhoods (for more than 2 hours) requires a residential parking sticker. This fall the DC Parking Enforcement and Georgetown University will be working closely to enforce parking rules in neighborhoods around the University.

4584 Indian Rock Terrace Raze Application

A developer plans to demolish the house at 4584 Indian Rock Terrace and construct 3 houses on the lot. At its September meeting, ANC3D commissioners voted 7-0-0 to support this plan "which may be built by-right based on the size of this lot and its R-1-B zoning." The developer answered questions at the meeting, and there were no comments by neighbors of the property.

Planning to Make Changes to your Home? Guidelines for the Foxhall Village and Colony Hill Historic Districts

As the Foxhall Village Historic District approaches its 20th anniversary and the Colony Hill Historic District celebrates 5 years, it's a good moment to reflect on our shared success and make sure residents new and old are aware of what it means to live with historic guidelines. Foxhall Village and Colony Hill were planned communities designed in the 1920s and 30s and both have a recognized sense of architectural harmony. Both Historic Districts are listed in the DC Inventory of Historic Sites and in the National Register of Historic Places, which currently includes more than 70 designated historic sites in the District. The list of sites can be found at <https://planning.dc.gov/node/886122>.

For residents of either historic district (the rules do vary slightly), if you have plans for exterior changes beyond basic home maintenance before starting work, please contact our neighborhood representative in the DC Historic Preservation Office (DCHPO), Anne Brockett. Anne can be reached at anne.brockett@dc.gov or 202-442-8842. She can advise as to whether you will need a permit, how the permitting process works, as well as what alterations will most likely be approved. Additionally, if you have questions about planned projects, what has typically been approved in the past or just basic questions about dos and don'ts, please feel free to contact me (pauldonvitodc@gmail.com or 202-375-4662).

As a reminder, DCHPO focuses mainly on changes to front facades or primary elevations (some houses also have prominent side elevations facing alleys or streets) as well as changes to roofs (especially slate replacement) and permanent landscaping changes (retaining walls, walkways, porches, etc.) But they have jurisdiction over all elevations. Here is a quick list of alterations that need permits and staff review. Please note that other items may come up that are not on this list – so always best to call first:

- Replacement windows or front doors
- Basement window expansion
- Slate roof replacement – Please note that there is one type of slate on the Boss and Phelps homes and another on the Waverly Taylor homes.
- Solar panels (typically they should be hidden from street view)
- Retaining walls (new or replacements)
- Front walk or step replacement or covering or new railings.
- Any proposed alterations to the details (chimney pots / bas reliefs / decorative brick and stonework, etc.) These elements are a large part of what makes our historic districts special.
- And of course, additions (even when not visible from the street).

In short, almost any permanent change that impacts what can be seen from the street (as well as a few that don't) requires a permit and staff review. For more details, please refer to our neighborhood design guidelines, which are available on DCHPO's website.
